Key terms

Racism is behavior rooted in the combination of prejudice and power

Systemic describes imbedded attitudes and behaviors in social, civil and institutional structures

The most widely and deeply imbedded of all attitudes and behaviors is SIN.

I. A courageous Christian embraces the fact of God's new humanity.

Ephesians 2:14-17

14 For he himself is our peace, who has made the two groups one and has destroyed the barrier, the dividing wall of hostility, 15 by setting aside in his flesh the law with its commands and regulations. His purpose was to create in himself one new humanity out of the two, thus making peace, 16 and in one body to reconcile both of them to God through the cross, by which he put to death their hostility. 17 He came and preached peace to you who

were far away and peace to those who were near.

II. A courageous Christian regularly asks God to examine her/his heart

Psalms 139:23-24

Search me, God, and know my heart; test me and know my anxious thoughts. See if there is any offensive way in me, and lead me in the way everlasting.
